Haida Gwaii (Queen Charlotte Islands), which includes two large and about 150 small islands, lie from thirty to eighty miles off the north coast of British Columbia, between N 52° and 54° 15'. Haida territory in southeastern Alaska extended to about N 55° 30'. This is an ecologically diverse territory, with considerable variation from one another in rainfall, flora, fauna, topography, and soil. At the time of first contact with Europeans in the late 1700s, the Haida were settled in a number of towns that formed six regional-linguistic subdivisions: the Kaigani people in Alaska and, on Haida Gwaii, the people of the north coast of Graham Island, the Skidegate Inlet people, the people of the west coast of Moresby Island, the people of the east coast of Moresby Island, and the southern (Kunghit) people. In the 1970s four divisions were still recognized.
